Summary

<u>Chrysanthemum</u> is the story of a mouse who loves her name. She loves the way it sounds and she loves the way it looks. She thinks her name is perfect until she goes to school. At school her classmates make fun of her name because it is so long. Chrysanthemum has to learn how to ignore the bullies and love her name again.

Activity Ideas

- Ask the children to share the most important event from the beginning of the story. Ask
 the children to share the most important event from the middle of the story. Ask the
 children to share the most important event from the end of the story.
- As a class, create a chart of the words ending in "ly" in the story. Post the chart in the Writing Center.
- Send home the Parent Connection and ask parents to help their child answer the questions. Ask children to share their conversations.
- Ask the children to draw a picture of the most important lesson they learned from Chrysanthemum.
- Ask the children to make as many words as they can from the letters in Chrysanthemum.
 Ask the children to make as many words as they can from the letters in their own names.
- As a class, create a list of unique names. Post the chart in the Writing Center.
- Ask the children to complete an "ly" chart finding words that end in "ly", telling where they found the word, and using the word in a sentence. Share. Perhaps create a class chart.
- Bring in pictures of the flowers mentioned in the story: chrysanthemum, daisy, Lily of the Valley, delphinium, and marigold. Ask children to draw a picture of their favorite flower.

- What does Chrysanthemum love about her name?
- What makes Chrysanthemum change her mind about her name?
- What does Chrysanthemum think about her name after she goes to school?
- What do Chrysanthemum's mother and father say about her name?
- What do the children at school say about Chrysanthemum's name?
- What does Mrs. Twinkle say about Chrysanthemum's name?
- How do Chrysanthemum's mother and father try to make her feel better when she comes home from school?
- What was Chrysanthemum's dream?
- What was Chrysanthemum's nightmare?
- Why do you think the author included the epilogue?
